The Moloch of Totalitarianism monument

For more than ten years, the day of the Russian New Martyrs and Confessors Assembly has been marked in freezing February. Pilgrims come from the Petersburg parishes, including many young people and children. After the requiem, there are baskets of commemorative pastries. It is bright from the snow and memory.

We began to think about building a memorial chapel, each one of us with politically repressed family members. We decided that it should be a shared, open matter. We spoke about it on the Prince Vladimir Cathedral website.

In 2010, the St. Petersburg Institute of Architecture, Ltd., and the St. Petersburg Institute Lenproektrestavratsiya, Inc., prepared a draft plan. The total interior space of the memorial chapel would be 12 x 12 meters. Below it would be another chamber, a commemorative one with a library, portraits of the dead, and a digital Book of Remembrance. It would be warm in the chapel in winter and cool in summer.

The unveiling of the plan took place in 2010 at the National Library of Russia, together with the presentation of the tenth volume of A Leningrad Martyrology.

The chapel should be built with communal funds. We have placed an alms box in the Prince Vladimir Cathedral and opened a special account.

In 2011 the Petersburg Commission for the Restoration of the Rights of the Rehabilitated Victims of Political Repression passed a resolution regarding the special cultural and social significance of the new chapel.

On June 24, 2012, the day of All the Saints Who Have Shone Forth in the Land of St. Petersburg, a Divine Liturgy was performed at Levashovo Memorial Cemetery.

We invite you to take part in the building of the memorial chapel.
